

Theories of Child Endangerment (TCE)

Theory Defined: A testable method of explaining certain behavior or circumstances, based on observation, experimentation and reasoning.

Question: What conditions, hazards, or dangers are present in a drug environment that could pose a risk to a child in violation of Penal Code section 273a (a) or (b)?

- 1. Physical abuse
- 2. Sexual abuse
- 3. Emotional abuse
- 4. Neglect
- 5. Drugs (accidental overdose of children)
- 6. Needles/syringes
- 7. Smoking pipes
- 8. Weapons (guns, knives, swords, pepper spray, taser, etc.)
- 9. Booby traps
- 10. Marijuana grows
- 11. Clan lab in structure
- 12. Danger of explosion
- 13. Danger of fire
- 14. Toxic fumes (from chemicals, lab or second hand drug smoke)
- 15. Dangerous/hazardous chemicals
- 16. Contaminated food/drink
- 17. Contaminated structure/house/vehicle/items
- 18. Pornographic photographs, materials, or sex toys
- 19. Children being provided drugs
- 20. Children being traded for drugs and/or sex
- 21. Evidence of domestic violence
- 22. Dangers associated with being around people under the influence (parents vs. others)
- 23. Dangers associated with being around drug trafficking (drug rip-off, deviant people)
- 24. Dangers associated with gang activity/members
- 25. Inappropriate sleeping conditions
- 26. Lack of food, support, discipline, encouragement, guidance, grooming, and supervision
- 27. Lack of medical/dental care (chronic health problems)
- 28. Lack of/or immunization delay
- 29. Children testing positive for drugs/chemicals
- 30. Lack of parental care increases risk of injury to children
- 31. Children in a car with a DUI driver
- 32. Social/emotional consequences (school problems, criminal behavior, homelessness, unemployment, addictions, isolation, poor peer relations, poor anger management, feelings of guilt and shame, chaotic lifestyle, and attachment disorder)
- 33. Code enforcement, fire and building violations
